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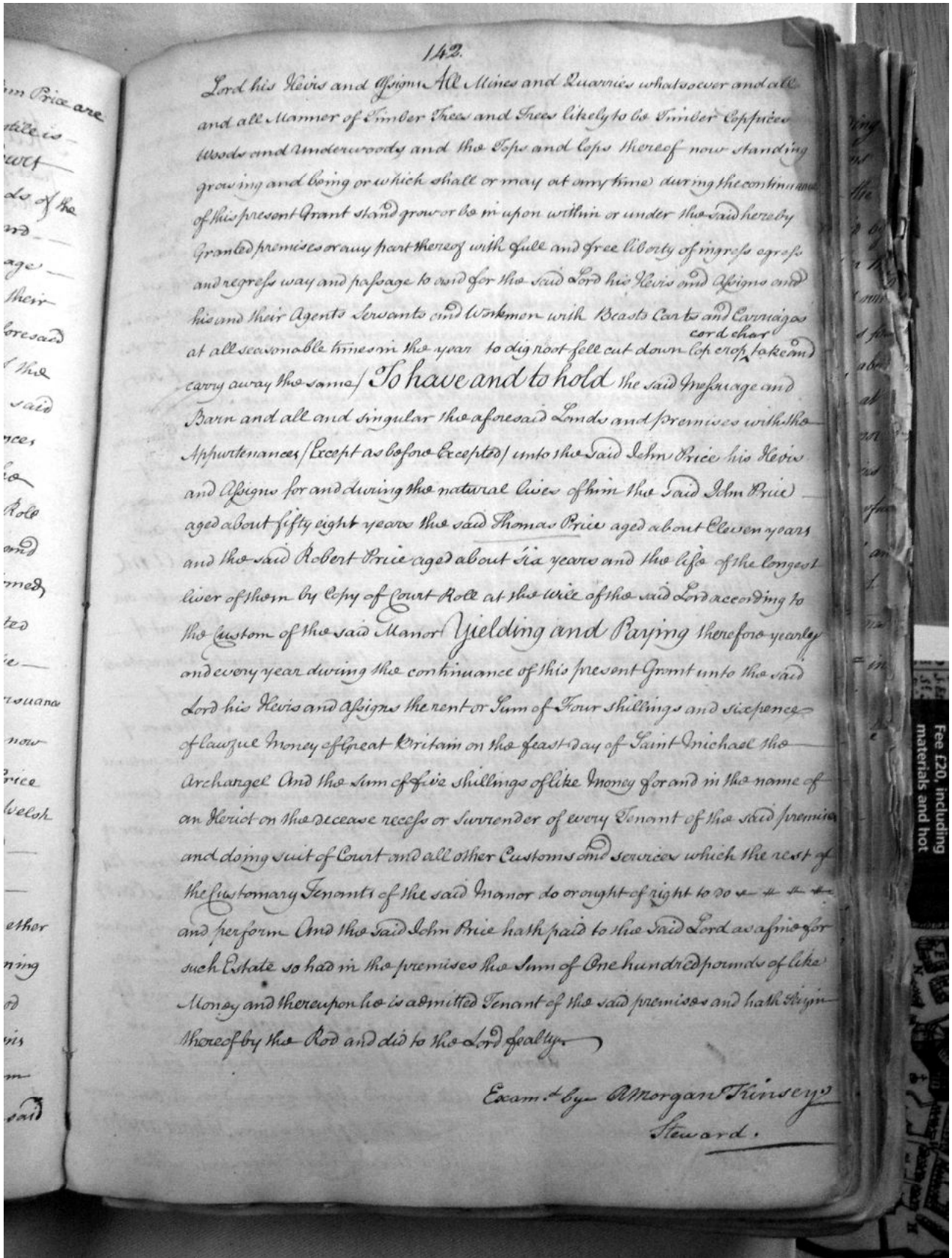
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The Rod And Whereas ^{141.} the said Elizabeth Price and Lam Price are
 since dead and upon their deaths the said John Price became and still is
 solely entitled to the said premises for his life. Now to this Court
 came the said John Price and by the Rod Surrendered into the hands of the
 Lord of the said Manor by the acceptance of his said Deputy Steward
 according to the custom of this said Manor All that the said Mesuage
 Barn and eighteen Acres of Land Customary Welsh Measure with their

 lives as aforesaid To which request of the said John Price and in pursuance
 of his said Surrender the said Lord of the Manor aforesaid is pleased and now
 doth in open Court by his said Deputy Steward Grant unto the said John Price
 All that the said Mesuage Barn and eighteen Acres of Land Customary Welsh
 Measure with their Appurtenances Which said Lands consist of an Orchard
 containing about half a Cover Six pieces of Arable Land containing together by
